





Purposes of Civic Academy / Education

- 1. Foster shared **civic values** and virtues.
- 2. Develop civic skills in logic, ethics and civil discourse.
- 3. Forum for **dialogue** to arrive at what is true and in the **common good** (**shared understanding, social unity**).
- 4. Cultivate **servant leadership**.
- 5. Cultivate in the **citizenry** an appetite for wise **stewardship** (guardians, medical doctor rather than candy store owner).
- 6. Foster individual and collective human flourishing.





FIRST PRINCIPLES OF LEARNING

Learning requires exploration of one's identity.


Learning involves recognizing that some knowledge is sacred and only shared with permission and/or in certain situations.


